About Florida KIDS COUNT

Florida KIDS COUNT (FKC) is in the Department of Child & Family Studies at the College of Behavioral and Community Sciences, University of South Florida.

FKC is part of a nationwide KIDS COUNT Network, a project of the Annie E. Casey Foundation. The KIDS COUNT Network is a national and state-by-state effort to track that status of children in the U.S. by providing policymakers and citizens with benchmarks of child well-being, KIDS COUNT seeks to enrich local, state, and national discussions concerning ways to secure better futures for all children.

The objective of Florida KIDS COUNT is to inform Floridians and their policy makers about the quality of life for Florida's children, and to build leadership and accountability for action on behalf of our children. Using selected key well-being indicators and general demographic profiles, Florida KIDS COUNT provides a consistent and reliable source of information that is adaptable to a variety of uses such as policy analysis, grant and proposal writing, needs assessments and public education. Data are made available for use at the national, state and local levels and include county specific information, statewide measures and comparisons among counties and regions within Florida. National comparisons are also available. FKC annually updates and disseminates national, statewide and county-level data on key indicators for Florida's children.

Growing and Growing Up

In Florida, our population is large and growing. We are now the third largest state in terms of population and the third fastest growing state (U.S. Census, 2014). In 2014, we had more than 19 million residents and we will likely have 2 million more by 2020. One in five of us is a child under the age of 18. And we are diverse. Among children, 45.2% of our children are White Non-Hispanic, 21.6% are Black or African -American, and 29.8% are Hispanic. Where children are concerned, we are already a majority 'minority' state. Why does this matter? Because we need the full contributions of all of our future citizens and they need the opportunity and support to grow physically, emotionally, educationally and economically. We need them to grow up to be to be an educated, prepared workforce. We need them to grow up to be taxpayers who support our schools, roadways, and Florida's breathtaking natural beauty. We need them to grow up to share their amazing cultural richness across our state. We need them to grow up to be good neighbors living in strong, vibrant communities. But to do that we need to help them grow and we need to help their families be the secure foundation children can count on. But how?

Economically

Despite economic recovery, the proportion of children living in poverty continues to rise in Florida and affects 1 in 4 of our state's children. Families face high housing cost burdens that consume onethird or more of their monthly income. And, while improving, the proportion of Florida's uninsured children remains higher than the national average of 5% (AECF, 2016). To help these children, we need to help their families. Education is the most enduring way to increase family income. Income that is in turn invested in their children and spent in our community businesses. So we need to support policies in which parents can increase their education and job skills and policies that enable children to attend quality educational programs that enable their parents to work with the peace of mind that their children are well cared for.

Education

Ranked 30th among the 50 states Florida has been making strides in education and improved its graduation rate and fourth graders' reading proficiency between 2007 and 2015 (AECF, 2016). However, we still have much to do to reduce absenteeism that affects 1 in 10 of Florida's students. There are both school-wide and individually focused strategies that will increase student engagement and not only improve attendance, but increase academic performance and reduce disciplinary problems. Speaking of discipline, we need to maintain a focus on school disciplinary actions that disproportionately affect Black and Hispanic students. More than ever, we need to continue and expand efforts that increase access to high quality early childhood education, including both sheer numbers and increasing the quality of staff teaching training and credentials as well as the environments in which we teach our youngest students.

Health

Florida has the most work to do in our health domain, as we rank very near the bottom – a 47 out of the 50 states (AECF, 2016). Still, Florida continues to make strides on all of its health indicators. Between 2008 and 2014, we have improved and there are fewer low birthweight babies being born, more children with health insurance, fewer child and teen deaths, and fewer adolescents abusing alcohol and drugs. To continue making strides, we need to support programs that promote prenatal care, nutrition and parent education. Last year lawfully residing children gained quicker access to health insurance. We also need to continue to focus on preventable teen violent death. One way we can is to promote sensible firearms legislation that limits access by minor children.

Risk factors

While we have noted many strengths, we also have factors that put our young citizens at risk. Prevention is essential to reducing these risk factors. Statewide in 2014 - 2015 we had more than 32,000 children with verified reports of child abuse and neglect. We know that home visiting programs are effective in preventing child abuse and neglect and have lifelong academic and economic benefits to participants. We also know that parental substance abuse and mental health issues are the number one reason children enter the child welfare system. Expanding access to treatment is key to reducing child abuse. Juvenile arrest? The good news is that arrest rates are falling, but we need to continue diversion and prevention programming, such as civil citations, that provide immediate consequences for misdemeanor offenses and which reduce recidivism as compared to adjudication in which months elapse between the offense and the consequence and which use large amounts of community resources.

So what to do?

We know what to do. The data in this book tell us where we need to work harder at the state level and in each of our counties. We know the studies show that investing in our children makes us all safer, more prosperous and our communities stronger for a lifetime.

Let's do it.





The Withlacoochee State forest on the eastern side also dominates the county. Industries include a nuclear power plant, health care facilities and retailers.



Demographic

- **Total population** The population for all ages and under age 18 by race and ethnicity.
 - Race "White NH" includes persons who designated white non-Hispanic as their only racial category, "Black NH" includes persons who designated black non-Hispanic or African American non-Hispanic as their only racial category, and "Other NH" includes persons who designated they were non-Hispanic and a single racial category other than white or black or who designated two or more races on the 2010 US Census. "Hispanic" may be of any race. See below for detailed race explanation.

Total population projections – The population projections for all ages and the population under age 18.

The Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) publishes all of the official economic, demographic, revenue, and agency workload forecasts that are developed by Consensus Estimating Conferences (Florida) and makes them available to the Legislature, state agencies, universities, research organizations, and the general public. EDR, through a contract with the University of Florida Bureau of Economic and Business Research (BEBR), arranges for annual estimates of the population of each city and county in Florida.

Data from the 1990, 2000, and 2010 censuses form the basis for Florida population estimates. Although census data are generally quite reliable, two issues regarding race and ethnicity complicate their use. First, in 1990 and all previous censuses, respondents were required to identify themselves as belonging to a single race. Starting in 2000, they were permitted to identify themselves as belonging to one or more races. In Florida, 97.5 percent of the population identified themselves as belonging to a single race in 2010 and 2.5 percent identified themselves as belonging to two or more races. These proportions are very similar to those reported in 2000 (97.6 percent and 2.4 percent, respectively). Second, although the U.S. Census Bureau defines "Hispanic origin" as an ethnic classification rather than a racial category, many respondents interpreted it as a racial category and listed their race as Hispanic, Latino, Mexican, Spaniard, or a similar response. In Florida, 3.6 percent of the total population in 2010 classified themselves as belonging to some race other than those listed on the census questionnaire; more than 90 percent of those respondents were of Hispanic origin. In 2000, 4.4 percent of the total population classified themselves as belonging to some race other than those listed on the census questionnaire; again, more than 90 percent of those respondents were of Hispanic origin.

Responding to these issues, the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) collaborated with the U.S. Census Bureau to create a set of

modified 2000 census counts for every state and county in the United States. Using a variety of data sources and techniques, the NCHS assigned people who classified themselves as belonging to more than one race (or who marked "some other race" on the census questionnaire) to a single primary race. These modifications produced data that were consistent over time, prevented double-counting of people belonging to more than one race, and provided a racial classification for Hispanics who did not identify their race. The NCHS released a comparable set of modified census counts for 2010. For 1990, the U.S. Census Bureau made modifications to the 1990 census counts in which persons listing "some other race" were assigned to a specific race - the modified age/race, sex, and Hispanic origin (MARS) files. Beginning with the 2014 Florida population estimates, estimates and projections were based on MARS data for 1990 and NCHS data for 2000 and 2010. For 2010, an updated April 1, 2010 population was used that includes Count Question Resolution (CQR) changes for Lake, Marion, and Miami-Dade counties from the Vintage 2013 NCHS bridged-race postcensal population estimates. There was also an additional adjustment for Gadsden County to correct for the institutional facility that the 2010 census failed to enumerate in the county.

U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey race and ethnicity

categories – The U.S. Census Bureau collects race data in accordance with guidelines provided by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB), and these data are based on self-identification. The racial categories included in the census questionnaire generally reflect a social definition of race recognized in this country and not an attempt to define race biologically, anthropologically, or genetically. In addition, it is recognized that the categories of the race item include racial and national origin or sociocultural groups. People may choose to report more than one race to indicate their racial mixture, such as "American Indian" and "White." People who identify their origin as Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish may be of any race.

The racial classifications used by the Census Bureau adhere to the October 30, 1997, Federal Register notice entitled, "Revisions to the Standards for the Classification of Federal Data on Race and Ethnicity" issued by OMB. These standards govern the categories used to collect and present federal data on race and ethnicity. OMB requires five minimum categories (White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander) for race. The race categories are described below with a sixth category, "Some Other Race," added with OMB approval. In addition to the five race groups, OMB also states that respondents should be offered the option of selecting one or more races.

If an individual did not provide a race response, the race or races of the householder or other household members were imputed using specific rules of precedence of household relationship. For example, if race was missing for a natural-born child in the household, then either the race or races of the householder, another natural-born child, or spouse of the householder were imputed. If race was not reported for anyone in the household, then the race or races of a householder in a previously processed household were imputed.

Definitions from OMB guide the Census Bureau in classifying written responses to the race question:

- White A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa. It includes people who indicate their race as "White" or report entries such as Irish, German, Italian, Lebanese, Arab, Moroccan, or Caucasian.
- Black or African American A person having origins in any of the Black racial groups of Africa. It includes people who indicate their race as "Black or African American." or report entries such as African American, Kenyan, Nigerian, or Haitian.
- American Indian or Alaska Native A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment. This category includes people who indicate their race as "American Indian or Alaska Native" or report entries such as Navajo, Blackfeet, Inupiat, Yup'ik, or Central American Indian groups, or South American Indian groups.
- Asian A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam. It includes people who indicate their race as "Asian Indian,"
 "Chinese,""Filipino,""Korean,""Japanese,""Vietnamese," and "Other Asian" or provide other detailed Asian responses.
- Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands. It includes people who indicate their race as "Native Hawaiian,""Guamanian or Chamorro,""Samoan," and "Other Pacific Islander" or provide other detailed Pacific Islander responses.
- Some Other Race Includes all other responses not included in the "White,""Black or African American,""American Indian or Alaska Native,""Asian," and "Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander" race categories described above. Respondents reporting entries such as multiracial, mixed, interracial, or a Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish group (for example, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, or Spanish) in response to the race question are included in this category.
- Two or More Races People may choose to provide two or more races either by checking two or more race response check boxes, by providing multiple responses, or by some combination of check boxes and other responses. The race response categories shown on the questionnaire are collapsed into the five minimum race groups identified by OMB, and the Census Bureau's "Some Other Race" category. For data product purposes, "Two or More Races" refers to combinations of two or more of the following race categories:
 - 1. White

- 4. Asian
- 2. Black or African American
- 3. American Indian or Alaska Native
- 5. Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander
- 6. Some Other Race

There are 57 possible combinations involving the race categories shown above. Thus, according to this approach, a response of "White" and "Asian" was tallied as Two or More Races, while a response of "Japanese" and "Chinese" was not because "Japanese" and "Chinese" are both Asian responses.

Hispanic or Latino origin – Hispanics or Latinos who identify with the terms "Hispanic," "Latino," or "Spanish" are those who classify themselves in one or more of the specific Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish categories listed on the questionnaire ("Mexican," "Puerto Rican," or "Cuban") as well as those who indicate that they are "another Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin." People who do not identify with any of the specific origins listed on the questionnaire but indicate that they are "another Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin" are those who identify as Dominican, Salvadoran, Guatemalan, Argentinean, Colombian, Spaniard, or other Spanish cultures or origins. Up to two write-in responses to the "another Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin" category are coded.

Origin can be viewed as the heritage, nationality group, lineage, or country of birth of the person or the person's parents or ancestors before their arrival in the United States. People who identify their origin as Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish may be of any race.

Age of householder – The householder's age in complete years at the time of the interview or completion of the paper questionnaire.

Householder – One person in each household is designated as the householder. In most cases, this is the person or one of the people in whose name the home is owned, being bought, or rented and who is listed on line one of the survey questionnaire. If there is no such person in the household, any adult household member 15 years old and over could be designated as the householder.

- Children under age 18 living in households The total population under 18 years in households (excluding householders, spouses, and unmarried partners) by their relationship to the householder.
 - **Own child** A never-married child under 18 years who is a son or daughter by birth, a stepchild, or an adopted child of the householder.
 - **Biological child** The son or daughter of the householder by birth.
 - Adopted child The son or daughter of the householder by legal adoption. If a stepson or stepdaughter has been legally adopted by the householder, the child is then classified as an adopted child.
 - **Stepchild** The son or daughter of the householder through marriage but not by birth, excluding sons-in-law and daughters-in-law.

Grandchild – The grandson or granddaughter of the householder.

- Other relatives In tabulations, the category "other relatives" includes any household member related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption, but not included specifically in another relationship category.
- Foster child or other unrelated child A foster child is a person under 21 years old, who is placed by the local government in a household to receive parental care. Foster children may be living in the household for just a brief period or for several years. Foster children are nonrelatives of the householder. If the foster child is also related to the householder, the child is classified as that specific relative. A child living in the household who is not related by birth, marriage, or adoption to the householder and who is not described by the categories given above.

Families – The total number of families. A family consists of a householder and one or more other people living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. All people in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family. A family household may contain people not related to the householder, but those people are not included as part of the householder's family in tabulations. Thus, the number of family households is equal to the number of families, but family households may include more members than do families. A household can contain only one family for purposes of tabulations. Not all households contain families since a household may be comprised of a group of unrelated people or of one person living alone - these are called nonfamily households. Families are classified by type as either a "married-couple family" or "other family" according to the sex of the householder and the presence of relatives. The data on family type are based on answers to questions on sex and relationship that were asked of all people.

Married-couple family – A family in which the householder and his or her spouse are listed as members of the same household.

Other family:

- Male householder, no wife present A family with a male householder and no spouse of householder present.
- Female householder, no husband present A family with a female householder and no spouse of householder present.
- Related children Any child under 18 years old who is related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. Related children of the householder include ever-married as well as never-married children. Children, by definition, exclude persons under 18 years who maintain households or are spouses or unmarried partners of householders.

Family households and married-couple families include same-sex married couples, beginning with the 2013 data.

Population for whom poverty status is determined – Poverty status was determined for all people except institutionalized people, people in military group quarters, people in college dormitories, and unrelated individuals under 15 years old. These groups were excluded from the numerator and denominator when calculating poverty rates.

Below poverty – The Census Bureau uses a set of dollar value thresholds that vary by family size and composition to determine who is in poverty. Further, poverty thresholds for people living alone or with nonrelatives (unrelated individuals) vary by age (under 65 years or 65 years and older). The poverty thresholds for two-person families also vary by the age of the householder. If a family's total income is less than the dollar value of the appropriate threshold, then that family and every individual in it are considered to be in poverty. Households – A household includes all the people who occupy a housing unit. (People not living in households are classified as living in group quarters.) Women, infant, and children (WIC) eligible served – The number of WIC eligible served during the calendar year. Applicants must meet all of the following 4 eligibility requirements to become eligible:

Categorical requirement

The WIC Program is designed to serve certain categories of women, infants, and children. Therefore, the following individuals are considered categorically eligible for WIC:

Pregnant women (during pregnancy and up to 6 weeks after the birth of an infant or the end of the pregnancy, postpartum (up to six months after the birth of the infant or the end of the pregnancy), breastfeeding (up to the infant's first birthday), infants (up to the infant's first birthday), children (up to the child's fifth birthday).

Residential requirement

Applicants must live in the State in which they apply. Applicants served in areas where WIC is administered by an Indian Tribal Organization (ITO) must meet residency requirements established by the ITO. At State agency option, applicants may be required to live in a local service area and apply at a WIC clinic that serves that area. Applicants are not required to live in the State or local service area for a certain amount of time in order to meet the WIC residency requirement.

Income requirement

To be eligible for WIC, applicants must have income at or below an income level or standard set by the State agency or be determined automatically income-eligible based on participation in certain programs.

Income Standard. The State agency's income standard must be between 100 percent of the Federal poverty guidelines (issued each year by the Department of Health and Human Services), and cannot exceed 185 percent of the Federal poverty income guidelines.

Automatic Income Eligibility. Certain applicants can be determined income-eligible for WIC based on their participation in certain programs. These include individuals eligible to receive SNAP benefits, Medicaid, and/or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF, formerly known as AFDC, Aid to Families with Dependent Children), or certain family members are eligible to receive Medicaid or TANF, or at State agency option, individuals that are eligible to participate in certain other Stateadministered programs.

Nutrition risk requirement

Applicants must be seen by a health professional such as a physician, nurse, or nutritionist who must determine whether the individual is at nutrition risk. In many cases, this is done in the WIC clinic at no cost to the applicant. However, this information can be obtained from another health professional such as the applicant's physician.

"Nutrition risk" means that an individual has medical-based or dietary-based conditions. Examples of medical- based conditions include anemia (low blood levels), underweight, or history of poor pregnancy outcome. A dietary-based condition includes, for example, a poor diet. At a minimum, the applicant's height and weight must be measured and blood work taken to check for anemia. An applicant must have at least one of the medical or dietary conditions on the State's list of WIC nutrition risk criteria.

Public school students eligible for free/reduced lunch – The number of

public school students eligible to participate in the free and reduced lunch program. Eligibility is based on reported income, the student's enrollment in a USDA-approved Provision 2 school, the student is enrolled in a USDA – approved Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) school and is identified as eligible for free meals based upon the Direct Certification determination or the extension of eligibility to the household due to eligibility of an identified direct certified student. Identified students include students directly certified through SNAP; TANF; the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations; children experiencing homelessness who have been identified on the local liaison's list; Head Start participants; identified migrant youth; identified runaways; non-applicants approved by local officials; foster children who are certified through means other than a household application; and those eligible for Medicaid.

It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day. The United States Department of Agriculture is responsible for overseeing the program nationally.  - Households with children only The number of households with no adult present.
- Sheltered and unsheltered homeless population The number of people who live on the streets or live in tents, cars, or abandoned buildings or are temporarily staying in emergency shelters or transitional housing.

- Homeless students The number of students enrolled in Florida's public school system who are living in emergency or transitional shelters, FEMA trailers, or abandoned in hospitals; sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason; living in cars, parks, temporary trailer parks or campgrounds due to lack of alternate adequate accommodations, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings or similar settings; living in hotels or motels; or awaiting foster care.
 - **Unaccompanied students** The number of homeless youth or students eligible for homeless services who are not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.

Public School Student Enrollment – The number of public school students enrolled in the Florida public school system based on the fall count.

The number of public school students enrolled in ELL classes who were not born in the U.S. and whose native language is other than English; or was born in the U.S. but comes from a home in which a language other than English is most relied upon for communication; or is an American Indian or Alaskan Native and comes from a home in which a language other than English has had a significant impact on his or her level of English language proficiency; and who as a result of the above has sufficient difficulty speaking, reading, writing or understanding the English language to deny him or her the opportunity to learn successfully in classrooms in which the language of instruction is English.

Non-Promotion – The retention of a public school student in the same grade rather than advancing the student to the next appropriate grade level.

Dropout – A student who withdraws from school for any reason cited in statute without transferring to another school, home education program, or adult education program. Includes but is not limited to any PK-12 student who was expected to attend a school but did not enter as expected for unknown reasons, was withdrawn from school due to court action, was withdrawn from school due to nonattendance, withdrew from school due to medical reasons, was withdrawn from school due to being expelled, whose whereabouts is unknown, and any student age 16 or older who leaves school voluntarily with no intention of returning.

- Disciplinary Actions More than one disciplinary action per student may have occurred during the year. These figures reflect the number of students receiving the discipline within the discipline category. Students are counted only once for each type of action.
 - In-School Suspensions The temporary removal of a student from the school program not exceeding ten days. In accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, this code must be used for all instances in which a child with a disability is temporarily removed from his/her regular classroom(s) for disciplinary purposes but remains under the direct supervision of school personnel.
 - Out-of-School Suspensions The temporary removal of a student from a school and the school program for a period not exceeding ten days, or extended beyond ten school days pending School Board hearing for expulsion.
 - Expulsions Student expelled from regular school without continuing educational services provided by the district or expelled from regular school with continuing educational services, which may include a disciplinary program or second chance school, and/or referred to the criminal justice or juvenile justice system.

Restraints

- Physical A personal restriction that immobilizes or reduces the ability of a student to move his or her torso, arms, legs, or head freely. The term physical restraint does not include a physical escort. Physical escort means a temporary touching or holding of the hand, wrist, arm, shoulder or back for the purpose of inducing a student who is acting out to walk to a safe location.
- Mechanical The use of any device or equipment to restrict a student's freedom of movement. The term does not include devices implemented by trained school personnel, or utilized by a student that have been prescribed by an appropriate medical or related services professional and are used for the specific and approved purposes for which such devices were designed, such as: adaptive devices or mechanical supports used to achieve proper body position, balance, or alignment to allow greater freedom of mobility than would be possible without the use of such devices or mechanical supports; vehicle safety restraints when used as intended during the transport of a student in a moving vehicle; restraints for medical immobilization; or orthopedically prescribed devices that permit a student to participate in activities without risk of harm.

Seclusion – The involuntary confinement of a student alone in a room or area from which the student is physically prevented from leaving. It does not include a timeout, which is a behavior management technique that is part of an approved program, involves the monitored separation of the student in a nonlocked setting, and is implemented for the purpose of calming.

Absent 21 or more days – The number of students who were absent 21 or more days during the school year. This is sometimes referred to as chronic absenteeism.

- Level 1 Inadequate Highly likely to need substantial support for the next grade/course.
- Level 2 Below satisfactory Likely to need substantial support for the next grade/course.
- Level 3 Satisfactory May need additional support for the next grade/course.
- Level 4 Proficient Likely to excel in the next grade/course.
- Level 5 Mastery Highly likely to excel in the next grade/course.

4th grade students not proficient in English Language Arts – The

percent of 4th grade students scoring inadequate, below satisfactory, and satisfactory on the English Language Arts FSA.

8th grade students not proficient in math – The percent of 8th grade students scoring inadequate, below satisfactory, and satisfactory on the Math FSA.

Federal Graduation Rate – Federal regulations require each state to calculate a four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate, which includes standard diplomas but excludes GEDs, both regular and adult, and special diplomas. The US Department of Education (USED) adopted this calculation method in an effort to develop uniform, accurate and comparable graduation rates across all states. The USED required states to begin calculating the new graduation rate in 2010-11. Florida's graduation rate is a cohort graduation rate. A cohort is defined as a group of students on the same schedule to graduate. The graduation rate measures the percentage of students who graduate within four years of their first enrollment in ninth grade. Subsequent to their enrollment in ninth grade, students who transfer out and deceased students are removed from the calculation.

Terminology and Sources — Continued

Entering transfer students are included in the graduation rate for the class with which they are scheduled to graduate, based on their date of enrollment. In the calculation, stringent guidelines are prescribed for not only the definition of a graduate, but also for the definition of a transfer. Students who transfer to adult education programs or Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) facilities remain with their regular high schools' cohorts.

- **Enrolled in nursery school, preschool** The number of children age 3 years and over enrolled in either public or private nursery school or preschool.
- Enrolled in kindergarten The number of children age 3 years and over enrolled in either public or private kindergarten.

- School readiness enrollment the number of children enrolled in the school readiness program. The School Readiness Program offers financial assistance to low-income families for early child education and care so families can become financially self-sufficient and their young children can be successful in school in the future. The program takes into account a child's physical, social, emotional and intellectual development; involves parents as their child's first teacher; prepares children to be ready for school; and gives parents information about child development and other topics of interest. - Voluntary Pre-K enrollment The number of children enrolled in the Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten program. Free pre-kindergarten is available to all 4-year-olds. Children must live in Florida and be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1 of the current school year to be eligible. If their fourth birthday falls Feb. 2 through Sept. 1 in a calendar year, parents can postpone enrolling their child in VPK that year and wait until the following year when their child is 5.

Head Start/Early Head Start funded enrollment – The number of children and pregnant women that are supported by federal Head Start/Early Head Start funds in a program at any one time during the program year; these are sometimes referred to as enrollment slots. Funded enrollment numbers include enrollment slots funded by state or other funds when used by grantees as required nonfederal match. States may provide additional funding to local Head Start programs, which is not included in federal Head Start/ Early Head Start reporting. Head Start/Early Head Start promotes school readiness for children birth to age 5 in low-income families by offering educational, nutritional, health, social, and other services.

- **Births and birth rate per 1,000 population** The number of live births by mother's race and county of residence and the number of live births per 1,000 resident estimated midyear population.
- Births receiving early prenatal care The number of births to resident mothers who received health care within the first three months of pregnancy. Prenatal care is calculated as the time elapsed from the date of the last menstrual period to the date of the first prenatal care visit.
- Low birthweight births Infants born to resident mothers who weighed less than 2,500 grams (5 lbs. 8.2 oz.) at birth.
- **Teen births and rates per 1,000 female population** The number of resident births to 15-19 year old females per 1,000 female midyear population of the same age group.
- Births to mothers who had initiated breastfeeding The number of births to resident mothers who had initiated breastfeeding at the time the birth certificate was completed. This does not measure whether or not the mother continued breastfeeding once at home.
- **Kindergarten immunization levels** The number of children entering kindergarten with up-to-date immunizations.

BMI screening results for 1st, 3rd, and 6th grade students – Florida schools are required to do Body Mass Index (BMI) screenings for students in 1st, 3rd, and 6th grade to identify children who are at risk for obesity which may lead to other health problems. The screening uses the child's age, height, and weight to determine body density. It does not take into account muscle mass or bone structure. BMI is a number calculated from a person's weight and height. BMI provides a reliable indicator of body fatness for most people and is used to screen for weight categories that may lead to health problems.

Healthy weight: 5th ≤85th percentile

- Underweight: <5th percentile
- Overweight: 85th <95th percentile

Obese: ≥95th percentile

Lead screening test for children under age 6 – The number of children under 72 months screened for lead. A blood lead test is the best way to measure lead exposure. Children are given a blood test to determine the level of lead in their blood. The amount of lead in blood is referred to as blood lead level (BLL). BLLs are measured in micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood (µg/dL). There is no known identified safe BLL.

Elevated blood level – The number of children screened for lead that had a blood lead level of 5 µg/dL or greater.

Asthma hospitalizations age 0-17 – The number hospitalizations due to asthma related illnesses for children age 0-17.

- Infant mortality rate The number of deaths during the first year of life to Florida residents per 1,000 live births.
- **Child death rate** The number of total deaths to children age 1-14 per 10,000 population of the same age group.
- **Teen violent death rate** The total number of deaths to teens age 15-19 from unintentional injuries, homicide, and suicide per 10,000 population of the same age group.

Risk Factors

Child protection/child welfare -

- **Children with verified maltreatment dispositions** The number and proportion of child protection investigations with verified maltreatment dispositions.
 - Investigation Once a call to the Florida Abuse Hotline is accepted, it is referred to either a Department of Children and Families or Sheriff's office for a Child Protective Investigator to conduct a thorough investigation that aligns with Florida's Safety Methodology.

This investigative finding is used when a preponderance of credible evidence exists that results in a determination that the specific harm or threat of harm was the result of abuse, abandonment or neglect. In high risk cases where abuse is verified, a referral to the Community Based Care (CBC) Lead Agency is made for services.

Children who experienced verified maltreatment within 6 months

of case closure – The number and proportion of children who experienced verified maltreatment within six months of case closure (i.e. termination of out-of- home services or in-home supervision).

This measure is based on exit cohort. Exit cohort are the children who "left" child protection system during a certain time period. An exit cohort for this measure is defined as all children for whom supervision was terminated as indicated by the date when the dependency case closed – End Date in Florida Safe Families Network (FSFN). Termination of Supervision is defined as closure of services including out-of-home care and in- home services. These children were followed up for 6 months to determine whether a subsequent child maltreatment report was received as indicated by the report received date in FSFN and the investigation resulted in disposition of verified maltreatment, that is, evidence sustained a finding that the child was a victim of maltreatment as defined by state law.

- Children served in out-of-home care (e.g. foster care) The number of children who received at least one day of out-of-home care services during the fiscal year.
- Children who exited out-of-home care for permanency reasons The number and proportion of all children exiting out-of-home care for permanency reasons within 12 months of the latest removal.

This measure is based on entry cohort. An entry cohort is defined as all children who were placed into out-of- home care during a given fiscal year and it is based on the date the child was removed from his/ her home as indicated by a Removal Date in FSFN. Only children who were in out-of-home care for at least eight (8) days were included in the calculation of this measure. Children were followed for 12 months from the date of removal from home to determine whether they were discharged from out-of-home care as indicated by Discharge Date in FSFN and achieved permanency. Permanency is defined as discharge from out-of-home care to a permanent home for the following reasons as indicated in FSFN: (a) reunification, that is the return of a child who has been removed to the removal parent or other primary caretaker, (b) permanent guardianship (i.e., long-term custody or guardianship) with a relative or non-relative, (c) adoption finalized, that is when the Court enters the verbal order finalizing the adoption, and (d) case dismissed by the court.

Children reunified within 12 months of the latest removal – The

number and proportion of children who were reunified (i.e., returned to their parent or primary caregiver) within 12 months of the latest removal.

This measure is based on entry cohort. An entry cohort is defined as all children who were placed into out-of-home care during a given fiscal year and it is based on the date the child was removed from his/her home as indicated by a Removal Date in FSFN. Only children who were in out-of-home care for at least eight (8) days were included in the calculation of this measure. Children were followed for 12 months from the date of removal from home to determine whether they were discharged from out-of-home care as indicated by Discharge Date in FSFN and achieved reunification, that is, the return of a child who has been removed to the removal parent or other primary caretaker. Reunification is identified based on one of the reasons for discharge as indicated in FSFN.

Median length of stay – The median length of stay for children in outof-home care (i.e., point in time measured in number of months at which half of the children are estimated to have exited out-ofhome care). This measure is based on entry cohort. An entry cohort is defined as all children who were placed into out-of- home care during a given fiscal year and it is based on the date the child was removed from his/her home as indicated by a Removal Date in FSFN. Only children who were in out-of-home care for at least eight (8) days were included in the calculation of this measure. This measure is presented in number of months between the date of removal from home as indicated by the Removal Date in FSFN and the date the child is discharged from out-of- home care as indicated by the Discharge Date. Children were followed for at least 12 months to assess the number of months passed before 50% of these children exited out-of-home care.

Children who reentered out-of-home care within 12 months of their

most recent discharge – The number and proportion of children who reentered out-of-home care within 12 months of their most recent discharge from out- of-home care for permanency reasons. This measure is based on exit cohort. An exit cohort is as the children who "left" out-of-home care during a certain time period. Specifically, an exit cohort is defined as all children who exited out-of-home care for permanency reasons during a given fiscal year and it is based on the date the child was discharged from out-of- home care as indicated by a Discharge Date in FSFN. Children were followed for 12 months from the date of discharge from out-of-home care for permanency reasons to determine whether they were subsequently placed in out-of-home care as indicated by a new Removal Date in FSFN.

Youth referred to the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice – The number of youth reported to the Juvenile Justice Information System (JJIS).

Transferred to adult court – The number of youth reported on the JJIS as having jurisdiction transferred for disposition in the state's adult courts by Direct File, Waiver or Indictment. Transfer of jurisdiction does not necessarily indicate a finding of guilt by the adult court, and it is common for the adult court judges to sentence offender to juvenile justice system sanctions.

High school youth who used alcohol or any illicit drug in the past 30 days – The percent of surveyed high school youth who indicated they had used alcohol or any illicit drug in the past 30 days.

Florida Department of Law Enforcement juvenile arrests – The total number of juvenile arrests.

Weapons violations – The number of juvenile arrests due to weapons violations.

Household Survival Budget – A measure providing the foundation for a threshold for economic survival which estimates the cost to afford the five basic household necessities (housing, child care, food, transportation, and healthcare) plus taxes and 10 percent of the total to cover cost overruns. The average annual Household Survival Budget for a four-person family living in Florida is \$47,484 which translates to an hourly wage of \$23.74, 40 hours per week for 50 weeks per year for one parent (or \$11.87 per hour each, if two parents work). The Household Survival Budget is one of the new standardized measurements used in the United Way ALICE Report and is comprised of data from various years and sources.
